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Business of Green: An appeal to slow down onbiofuel.

Last Friday an advisory panel to the EuropeanEnvironment Agency issued an extraordinaryscientific opinion: The European Union should suspend its goal o f having 10 percent oftransportation fuel made from biofuel by 2020.

The European Union's biofuel targets were increased and extended from 5.75 percent by 2010to 10 percent by 2020 just last year. Still, Europe's well-meaning rush to biofuels, the scientistsconcluded, had produced a slew of ha rmful ripple effects - from deforestation in SoutheastAsia to higher prices for grains.

In a recommendation released last weekend, the 20-

member panel, made up of some ofEurope's most distinguished climate scien tists, called the 10 percent target "overambitious" and an "experiment" whose "unintended effects are difficult to predict and difficult to control."

"The idea was that we felt we needed to slow down, to analyze the issue care fully and thencome back at the problem," Laszlo Somlyody, the panel's chair man and a professor at theBudapest University of Technology and Economics, said in a telephone interview.

He said that part of the problem was that when it set the targets, the Europe an Union wastrying desperately to solve the problem of rising transportation emissions "in isolation,"without adequately studying the effects of other secto rs like land use and food supply.

"The starting point was correct: I'm happy that the European Union took the lead in cuttinggreenhouse gasses and we need to control traffic emissions," S omlyody said.

"But the basicproblem is it thought of transport alone, without considering all these other effects. And wedon't understand those very well yet."

The panel's advice is not binding and it is not clear whether the European Co mmission will follow the recommendation.

It has become increasingly clear that the global pursuit of biofuels - encourag ed by a rash oftargets and subsides in both Europe and the United States - h as not produced the desired

Investigations have shown, for example, rain forests and peat swamp are bei ng cleared tomake way for biofuel plantations, a process that produces more emissions than the biofuels cansave.

Equally concerning, land needed to produce food for people to eat is planted with moreprofitable biofuel crops, and water is diverted from the drinking sup ply.

n Europe and the United States, food prices for items like pizza and bread ha ve increasedsignificantly as grain stores shrink and wheat prices rise.

The price of wheat and rice are double those of a year ago, and corn is a thir d higher, the UNFood and Agriculture Organization said this week.

"Food price inflation hits the poor hardest, as the share of food in their total expenditures ismuch higher than that of wealthier populations," said Henri Jo sserand of the Food and Agriculture Organization.

Biofuels are not, of course, the only reason for high food prices. Fuel to trans port food is moreexpensive with oil more than \$100 a barrel. There have bee n unexpected droughts this year aswell.

Should we conclude that all biofuels are bad?

No. But motivated by the obvious problems now emerging, scientists have be gun to take aharder look at their benefits.

For example, the European Environment Agency advisory panel suggests that the best use ofplant biomass is not for transport fuel but to heat homes and generate electricity. To beuseful for vehicles, plant matter must be distilled to a fuel and often transported long distances.
